

Help students be good digital citizens

Cyber Safety: tips for educators



1. Support and promote the use of technology as a positive learning tool.
2. Model and discuss the responsible and appropriate use of communication technology.
3. Establish rules for the use of technology in the classroom.
4. Be clear that inappropriate use of technology at school may result in the temporary confiscation of devices, or other consequences.
5. Ensure students know that recording or taking pictures of others, including staff, without their knowledge or consent is unethical and inappropriate.
6. Encourage students to keep personal information private. Recommend they do not share their full name, address, phone numbers or birth dates online.
7. Encourage students to use privacy

8. Ensure students are aware that all postings are public and permanent. Once messages or images are "out there," even on networks like Snapchat, they no longer have control over where it goes, or who sees it. Posts are never really deleted. They can be copied, photographed or saved.
 9. Emphasize the need for students to maintain a positive "digital footprint." Once something is posted, anyone and everyone, can see it including future employers, schools, partners - and their family.
 10. Encourage students to protect their friends online by practising the golden rule. Treat others the way you would expect to be treated when it comes to their "digital footprint."
